## THE FIELD OFFICER'S NOTE-BOOK.

THE CELEBRATION of The General's Seventy-sixth Birthday was fittingly held in Exeter Hall, under the presidency of the Chief of the Staff. The latest cable message from Australia had told us of his improved health, and that all was well. Everybody in the crowded Hall was jubilant. What is the secret of The General's perennial freshness and fighting force? The answer may surely be found in the Chief's own words:—

The Spirit of the living God carried him on. "Not by might, nor by power; but by My Spirit, saith the Lord." By endurance; by righteousness; by a single eye; by a burning zeal; by a boundless love, he has gone on to this day, doing the work God gave him to do, and God has prospered him. Let us pray for him that he may be spared for many, many years, and that every great and noble desire of his heart may be granted to him.

We are sure that it will be.

THE GENERAL'S VISIT to Palestine has been described as "a pilgrimage." And what a fine old fighting pilgrim The General is! Verily no fiery Crusader, who fought his way through hosts of Christ's enemies, ever deserved a glimpse of the Holy City—Jerusalem—more than did our veteran Leader. The unfurling of the Flag of The Salvation Army on Mount Calvary, too, was not only an interesting, but it was also a significant act. It has often been referred to as a type of the "blood-stained banner of the Cross." Millions have heard Christ preached beneath its folds. It was fitting that it should wave in the sunshine that bathed Calvary's rugged Hill on the day of The General's visit.

The description given of The General's pilgrimage to Olivet, to Gethsemane, to Calvary, to the Tomb of Christ, and the Mount of Ascension, is deeply interesting.
