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THE EDITOR'S NOTE-BOOK.

In view of an almost religious controversy among theologians and their respective followers, it is desirable that we should remind ourselves of the position we occupy in relation to all such controversies.

First, it is needless to repeat that we are against controversy of any kind. It does no good; it does a deal of harm. And the reason why we deplore the spread of the controversial spirit is because we have settled, once for all, the grounds of our faith and consecration. We have sworn to stand by them. We have registered them in the deed which defines The Salvation Army. We have covenanted in our Articles of War, in the papers that sealed our Officership, and by the commission we hold, to maintain these truths, to adorn them in our lives, to publish them wherever we go, and to compel all men, by the power of our experience as to their reality, and by the power of the Holy Ghost, to accept them as the means of their salvation in this, and for the next world.

We are not going back on these fundamental truths, because we dare not—nay, we cannot. We have fixed the standard of our faith, and the goal of all our enterprises, and there-

fore controversy on essential matters of faith would be a waste of time, as well as futile and injurious.

A Strong Position. This position is impregnable. It guarantees the unity of our Salvationism, and prevents us from embarking upon those dangerous voyages of philosophic speculations which in the past have swept so many good men and movements among the breakers and wreckers of souls. It prevents us opening our doors to all and sundry. According to the trend of things, the basis of Christian fellowship will soon be so broad as to hold not only non-believers in the supernatural, and in the Bible as the Word of God, but Agnostics, Polytheists, Theosophists, Buddhists, Shintoists, and all what-not.

We may go further, and almost prophesy that, if the nicely-glossed versions of evil, of which the world has heard so much of late, find wide acceptance, no barrier will stand in the way of liars, drunkards, and adulterers passing into the fold of the Christian Church on earth.

Happily our position, both as to creed and conduct, is such that we are virtually protected against all disturbing controversies of this character.
