THE GRACE OF PENITENCE

REPENTANCE is perhaps not sufficiently regarded as the work of the Holy Spirit, although when we read what the Bible tells us about it and watch its effect in the hearts where it is given a place, we see that it is truly one of God's best gifts to man.

Apart from the aid of His Holy Spirit true repentance is impossible to the sinner; but, though the germ or seed comes from above, with us remains the question whether or no we will cultivate the plant and give it that place in our hearts in which it can thrive and grow.

The secret of much of the failure, the so-called 'backsliding' and slackening off of those from whom we had hoped so much, can often be traced to the fact that their repentance has not been deep or lasting.

Conviction of sin may come as a lightning flash, swift and startling, in a moment illuminating and laying bare the wrongs and shortcomings of a whole life. At other times its operations may be likened to the plough, slowly passing over the heart and life, until at last the whole has been turned over and exposed.

But those whose repentance begins and ends with a few brief moments of conviction in a Meeting, or a quarter of an hour spent on their knees at the penitent-form, need not be surprised if their after-lives lack the beautiful results which follow true repentance of spirit.

Like all other graces of the Spirit, repentance has its counterfeits and imitations, which are so nearly like the real thing that we need careful insight to discern the difference; for a great deal of apparently real sorrow for sin is not repentance.

In true repentance the penitent is more troubled at the shame and harm brought upon Christ and the Kingdom by his sin than at the disgrace he has brought on himself.

'Hide my sin, spare me from the shame of discovery, let no one know how I have fallen.' So groans the sinner whose repentance is not of this deeper kind. The true penitent exclaims, 'Never mind me! Do what you like with me—only consider how best you can save the name of God from shame. Spare me no suffering that will shield the Kingdom.'
