Interest Them.

The F.O. must interest sinners, and this, like a great deal else he has to do, will cost him some trouble, but without it he will never accomplish much good. No man will obtain the ear of the ungodly long enough to benefit them, unless he can so far interest them as to make them listen to what he has to say.

Unless the F.O. can interest the people when he has got them, they will not stop to listen to him; or even if they do remain, he cannot reasonably expect that they will come again. It is no sense of duty that brings in the bulk of the unconverted people, to whom he has the chance of speaking; and no sense of duty will keep them there. He can only gain and keep their attention by making what he says affect and impress them, and from the same cause he can only reasonably expect that they will want to hear him again.

Everybody knows what a tendency there is in the mind to wander off from the subject on which a speaker is dwelling. Unconverted people do not feel the respon-

sibility of listening, and make no attempt to control their thoughts and follow the speaker. In fact they will often deliberately turn their attention, as soon as the F.O. begins speaking about religion, to their business, or their pleasures, or their anxieties. Although they may be steadily looking at the speaker all the time, and he thinks he has their attention, they will be thinking about something quite opposite to what he is saying, and it will be no wonder that they get no benefit out of his efforts.

Now the F.O. must be aware of this, and be continually guarding against it. He must always be doing or saying something fresh, or stating it in such a manner as is calculated to call home the wandering thoughts of his hearers. He can do this by pausing every now and then, or he can startle the people by lifting up his voice occasionally, or he can sing a verse, or walk about, or relate striking facts, or in other different ways he can shake the people up and make them listen to him.
