

"I recollect my Lieutenant and I going to our first Corps. I was fresh from the T.H., and strange to the household customs of the Yorkshire people, but I soon observed the way they cleaned the edges of their steps, as well as black-leaded the gratings and coal-cellar flaps in the front, etc. On the first Saturday morning I did likewise. I set to work and cleaned the windows and put up clean curtains, polished the door-knocker, and generally made things look bright. About three days after, one of the Soldiers informed me that a neighbour living opposite her had commented favourably upon the altered appearance of the house. Evidently a little thing like this has a greater effect than we are apt to think. "Of decent bedding, table-linen, curtains, etc., I have always obtained

more than enough, and it has not cost me a fraction.

"I have followed one plan that has never failed, and that is, I put in the Hall a list of 'things needed for the Quarters.'

"A small quantity of mahogany stain and twopennyworth of methylated spirit will make every chair and table, in an ordinary Quarters, look like new. A small bottle of gold paint will do the same for the pictures.

"I wish to add, I always carry a few useful tools with me. These enable me to do little odd jobs in the way of repairs, etc., and pays over and over again. Comrades, let us have God in our Quarters, and if we all do our part in matters of this kind, we shall become a greater blessing to each other."
