## Our Assets and Liabilities as an Army

## THE SUBSTANCE OF AN ADDRESS GIVEN TO OFFICERS

THE word asset means a person's stock-in-trade and other possessions, and sometimes represents what a man or firm is worth. Liability means indebtedness to others or claims against the assets.

Every business man, whether he be working for himself, for a partnership, or a corporation, feels it is his duty at the close of the year to take account of his assets and his liabilities in order to ascertain his true financial position. He carefully inventories the property in his possession, examines his debits and his credits, and, if a true business man, also takes account of the conditions of the country and of the channels of trade.

From all these he draws up a statement for his firm or corporation, if he be a manager, or for his own information, and is thus able to decide whether he has profitably used the last year, or whether the prospects are such that he can continue in the business with justice to himself, his creditors, and his family.

As Officers of this great Organization, The Salvation Army, we ought to follow the example of the prudent business man, and endeavour to ascertain as fully as we can the exact position

occupied by our Army, what we may expect will happen to it and to us in the future, and our duty in the circumstances.

The assets or strength of The Army consists of various matters, each of importance, and each to be carefully considered; but the whole ground cannot be fully covered here.

It seems to me that one of the most important factors in judging the strength of a community, of a government, or of a religious movement is its history; for if that teems with the records of the deeds of good men, it will be a constant inspiration to their descendants to emulate, and if possible exceed, their achievements.

## Consider our Past History

We may safely claim that this item of the assets of our beloved Army is unequalled. When we study the history of the founders of The Army—our beloved General, his sainted wife and the little band of heroic workers who gathered around them—how they planted the Flag in London, and then sent it throughout Great Britain, to other countries, and even heathen lands; when we read of their labours and self-denial and bravery, of
