## LIBERTY OF PERSONAL TESTIMONY

LIBERTY of personal testimony is among the most precious of the privileges of The Salvation Army Soldier. In this he possesses a considerable advantage over the ordinary Church member, although the Churches of late years have to some extent wakened to a sense of the value of the public testimony of their members in the battle against sin. Hence the growth of such auxiliaries to their ordinary services as 'Endeavour' meetings and open-air mission bands where the rank and file may find some outlet for their spiritual energies.

But among organizations which give liberty of personal witnessing for Christ to all their members without distinction, and which make it one of their chief lines of attack on the kingdoms of evil, The Army stands as pioneer and unsurpassed, if not absolutely alone. How much of the rapid spread of our glorious crusade throughout the world is due to the exercise of this liberty of personal testimony on the part of our Soldiers would be difficult to determine. It is certain, however, that it has played a large and decisive part. The work in some of our largest

Territories was begun by the unprompted testimony of Converts who, like the Jerusalem Church when scattered abroad by persecution, went everywhere preaching the Word and establishing the Kingdom by the word of their testimony. The example of the sinful woman of Samaria, who turned away from Christ at the wellside to go and testify to her fellow-townsperson and win them over to Him, is being multiplied constantly by our Converts in Korea and Java, India and Africa. The newly-saved return to their distant homes and bear such effective witness to what Christ has done for them that whole communities are prepared to receive The Army and to hear the good news of Salvation.

The preaching of the Apostles was largely experimental. The substance of their discourses was shot through and through as by threads of gold with personal testimony. Peter at Pentecost was not content to expound the Jewish Scriptures, and smite his hearers with this double-edged sword of piercing truth; but 'with many other words did he testify and exhort' as well. Paul before Agrippa
