THE MISSIVE OF JOY

Angels sang a new song and the earth caught it up. Music and singing heralded His advent. He made music and loved it and sent it forth to the ends of the earth as one of His happy messengers, and it will travel on till all the peoples join in the great song of joy.

Apostles of Joy

Now, I dare to say that The Salvation Army Officer is also sent to the world to bring joy. He brings a sword often, I know, and his own way is often a way of wounds and griefs. Struggles with selfishness and sin, war with vice and hate, real battling with human passion and doubt, all involve many things that are far enough removed from joy. I quite believe that. I know it. I feel it. Personal experience has placed it beyond question with me. For I also know with you, my dear comrades, what it means to drink the cup, to be left alone, to suffer the midnight arkeness, to fight with beasts and

devils, and to face the hatred of Hell in plucking the prey from the foe. Yes, I know, and I doubt whether there is an Officer amongst us, including the youngest Lieutenant, who has not had to pass through some part of the dark night of anguish on account of the world's ruin, and to pass through it alone.

Not Always Our Own

But still, I hold to it that like our Divine Master we are sent to bring joy. I do not say that we always participate in the joy we bring. I could not say so. I know that from time to time many of us go on for long stretches—plodding on, daring to believe and love in spite of trial and disappointment enough to break our hearts a dozen times, experiencing the while little of any kind of emotion that could truly be called joy. I know it, I say. In fact, I am proud of it. We are not out for our own, not even for our own happiness. And it is often a kind of satisfaction to me to reflect how many Officers do go on—steadily on—with duty and obedient patient faithfulness, while finding little joy in it all for their own poor tried and bleeding hearts.
