“MY OFFICERS.”

BY THE GENERAL.

[In a new book, of considerable charm and interest—“The Romance of The Salvation Army,” 3s. 6d., of the Publishing Department, Fortess Road—Miss Hulda Frederichs has given the public a graphic description of the inception, rise, and world-wide advance of this great Movement. With the skill and facility of an experienced writer, the talented authoress portrays our Leaders, analyses our methods, and illustrates our principles, all of which she invests with the glow of romance, so patent to the eye of the observant “outsider.” Our comrades will enjoy reading the book for themselves, and, not least, the admirable preface supplied by The General, from which we quote the following eloquent tribute to “My Officers.”—ED.]

My Officers, as a whole, are one of the most remarkable and, I think, most important facts of The Army. In the early days my chief difficulty—as also my chief necessity—was to obtain the help of men and women whose spirit would fit them for the work I wanted to be done. From the very first I saw that I must raise these co-workers from amongst the class to whom I wished them to minister; if they were to be for the people in the sense I required, it was a necessity that they should be of the people. I recognised this, and resolved that no disadvantage as to birth, or education, or social condition should debar anyone from entering the list of combatants so long as he was one with me in love for God, in faith for the salvation of men, and in willingness to obey the orders he

should receive from me and from those I authorised to direct him. I have, of course, had many disappointments—not a few of them very hard to bear at the time—but from the early days of 1868, when I engaged my first recognised helper, to 1878, when the number had increased by slow degrees to about a hundred, and on to the present day, when their number is rapidly approaching twenty thousand, there has not been a single year without its increase, not only in quantity, but in quality.

I am sometimes asked, What about those who have left me? Well, I am thankful to say that we remain in sympathetic and friendly relations with the great bulk of them. It was to be expected that in work such as ours, demanding, as it does, not only arduous
