The Siege of London was a fine object-lesson in concentrated effort. Oh, for a united and concentrated effort to bring to the front our women! What a great deal this would mean to our Army. Whilst stationed at W—, I found that we had thirty to forty servants in the Corps, and that they seemed isolated, almost strangers in many instances. I formed a Servants' League, appointing as a Sergeant a young woman, who herself was a domestic, to mother them. They met at the Hall on their 'night out' and took the platform occasionally. One or two became Candidates, and the

Brigade accepted responsibility in various Corps Efforts.

May I add that, converted twenty years ago in a little Methodist Chapel, and coming soon after to Highgate I became a Salvationist because women were given equal opportunity to be used by God, and my desires to win souls found encouragement in the Hall and in those 'Open-Air' days when we had no Hall and where we frequently had the joy of kneeling at the drum-head with poor penitent souls.
