of truth, that a suitable education is that which puts people into right relationship with their surroundings. The Salvationist, therefore, who is properly educated, being thereby put into right relationship with God, with The Army, with the laws of physical health, with his work, and with the people, is bound to be useful to the Kingdom and joyful in his own experience, no matter how adverse may be his outward circumstances.

The rightly - educated Salvationist will strive after continual improvement. Realizing above everything else the eternal importance of the work in which he is engaged, he sees the tremendous need for efficiency, and hence for the highest possible cultivation of all his powers. This improvement he largely attains as a natural result of his thorough, consistent performance of every duty, but as far as he has opportunity, he also puts forth direct efforts to increase his knowledge and capabilities, thus gradually fitting himself for more and more important service both here and hereafter.

The early part of one's career is, of course, primarily the time for education, but, in the broadest sense, the whole of life is an education under our Heavenly Father's tuition. As with scholars of other kinds, however, our progress depends chiefly upon our own earnest exertions. We should, therefore, continually 'study to show' ourselves 'approved unto God,' always remembering that that education which does not help one more eagerly to obey the voice of God, more effectively to realize in one's own life and work the great purposes of Jesus Christ, and which, instead of making one more humble, teachable, and deeply devoted to the interests of the unschooled masses, creates prigs and cut-and-dried sermonizers who are lifted far above the sorrows and struggles and defeats of poor sinning souls—that such an education is to be utterly despised.

That, indeed, is the great danger of education. Far better than that would be the simple ignorance that still leaves a man humble, trustful, warm of heart, and capable of high enthusiasm.

'NOT BY BREAD ALONE'

A MEDITATION ON A LESSON OF THE TEMPTATION OF JESUS

If Jesus had followed the suggestion of Satan, 'Command that these stones be made bread,' He certainly would not have been an example for us in similar temptations, for He then would have exercised a power—that of His Godhead—that you and I do not possess. He therefore refused to work the miracle, but depended on the Providence of God to supply His human need—just as you and I have to do. And in the supply of this, God has never failed.

Satan's constant effort is to turn the human mind into channels of material things, to make us chiefly concerned about the body and its food, its comfort, pleasure, and adornment, his aim being to cause us to forget God as much as possible and to live only for the things of the present.

The reply of Jesus, however, is significant and far-reaching, and implies other needs besides those of the body. He reminds us that we need more than material food for the sustenance of our three-fold nature. We must have food for MIND and SPIRIT as well as for the body. Life is essential in

each of these three realms of our being. A man who had life only in his body would be an idiot in mind and 'dead' in his spiritual nature. Most people are alive in both body and mind, but thousands are dead so far as their spiritual nature is concerned; their Divine faculties not having been quickened by the energizing touch of the Holy Spirit in answer to prayer and faith in God's saving grace.

Of what use is bread to the MIND of a man, except in so far as it sustains his body, in and through which his mind operates? The mind must be fed and sustained by reading, meditation, conversation, and other exercises; but its strength and beauty depend entirely on the themes that occupy it, or, in other words, on the food that it takes. The well gives forth exactly the kind of water with which it is supplied; it may be clear, or muddy, or sweet, brackish, or hot, or cold. And so our mind will pour forth its contents according to the purity or otherwise of its supplies. How essential it is, therefore, that the
