Installation of

Sunday 27 July 2025

The Gap was closed! On Thursday 24 July Captain Debbie assumed the responsibility for Woking Corps and this was her formal installation led by the Assistant Divisional Commander, Major Tracey Palmer, from Divisional Headquarters.

As a complete surprise to Captain Debbie, members of her family, including her father, had travelled up from Tiverton to be present at the meeting. Captain Debbie's ordination and commissioning had taken place in 2020 – the Covid year. There were only seven people present at her welcome and installation at Hastings – all socially distanced and wearing masks. The family had decided this was going to make up for the disappointment of 2020!

From the 'get go' we were into scripture and reminded of the trust and confidence found in Psalm 23 and

then into the more modern arrangement of 'Praise, my soul, the king of Heaven.'

Major Tracey, who had known Captain Debbie for over 10 years invited us to take a card from the Mercy Seat and write a short prayer / message to Captain Debbie and these would later be put into an album for her to use in her prayers.

Prayers were offered for Debbie and her husband John who is very much a part of her ministry team as it were.

Children from Kids' Church presented a welcome plant and several members of the Teen Church offered prayers. One prayer urging that 'Captain Deb-

Major Tracey took Captain Debbie through the official installation ceremony. Written some years back the ceremony requires the new officer to renew their promises and commitment to the corps and community and for the congregation to promise their support of the officer.

Corps Secretary Andrew Cox welcomed John & Debbie on behalf of the Corps in a sincere and eloquent manner – with a hint of humour.

The scripture reading, 1 Peter 5:2 -7 was read by John (H) – the following week we were to hear more of John's own story of forgiveness and transformation.

Captain Debbie spoke of how that scripture would be the first and last scripture she would preach from in her appointments. We looked at the role and qualities of a shepherd. The need to be an 'influencer' - just where we are.

Sadly, the photos were taken after


both Alisons had to leave, but we're grateful for their presence earlier. Morewa, Nkhosa, and I even gave karate a go!




An update on two projects the H & C Group have been involved in. Teddy Toddlers was also involved in the second one.

Stand Up, Stand Out, Proclaim:

My week as a Ministry Assistant at Horsham Salvation Army Ethan Mushati

My time at Horsham was truly a blessing in disguise as I stood up – and stood out – in my faith. See, a few months ago, I had no idea I'd end up being a Ministry Assistant at Horsham. Placement plans – one after another. I went from, Specsavers, to British Heart Foundation to Horsham SA. And I

thought, 'Lord what is happening now?' But now I know – He was orchestrating something greater. He led me there. To Horsham Salvation Army. Not by chance, not by accident, but by divine design.

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Throughout this week, I saw firsthand the inner workings of The Salvation Army. The most incredible part was that I wasn't just an observer, as I was given a chance to take part in the action. The Leadership team did great work in orienting me in the operations of the Salvation Army. I was truly grateful as it has made look at the UKI Territory through a new and refined lens. And in a way, it sort of makes the connection with the Army more intimate and less superficial as my understanding is now slightly broader.

Moving on from admin, I got to engage with various programs running at the Corps. From conversing with seniors in a bible study to high fiving toddlers in a toddlers' group. This showed me that the Army is not just for a certain group of people, but for everyone. Though some members of the Corps mistook me for a Cadet visiting from William Booth College, which was very amusing to me as I had to explain who I was every time I met the same people.

One program which really stood out to me was the one they run on a Thursday evening, called Hope in Communities. Those in need come to the hall and they have a community meal (full on dinner) before they engage with counsellors who are volunteers from the Corps and other Christian groups within Horsham. After they have had a meeting with the counsellor they are then given a list of the things available in the food bank, and they then choose from the items they need. I was truly inspired, and my heart was touched as I saw families and individuals alike being given hope and having meaningful conversations during the community meal. I saw themes of hope, courage, and resilience during that event. And part of their community support services is to provide individuals experiencing homelessness access to showers at the Horsham Salvation Army and clothing as well through their drop-in service.

The week also saw me preparing to lead worship on the Sunday that I would end my WEX. This was a mountain I had been waiting to climb for so long. In all that excitement and zeal, I faced one big obstacle – which was my ability to choose a song and stick to it. I'd like to think that it ended up with 4 versions of the same meeting plan. I never knew that it was going to be that difficult because this was the first time I had led a meeting which I had planned all on my own. However, at the end, I managed to land on the perfect songs.

My theme on Sunday was the same as the title above, Stand Up, Stand Out, Proclaim. The theme was based around the stories of; The man at the pool of Bethsaida, John the Baptist and Paul and Silas singing in prison at the middle of the night. During the meeting we had a prayer time, where I encouraged congregants to write down something that was keeping them from fully standing up, that thing which weighed them down or was like a magnet, which stopped them from Standing Up, just like the man at the pool. As the song, I Surrender All, played in the background, I invited all who had written on their pieces of paper to come and leave them at the mercy seat. As this was taking place I could almost visualize Jesus telling the people to Stand Up, pick up their mats and work, but instead of going with that mat we surrendered it to Christ so that we can freely walk. There was also a time of testimonies where I encouraged people to Stand Out in their faith. And to my surprise more people stood up to testify how they are being led by God in this year as we sang the song By His Hand.

The Bible reading came from *John 5:1-9*

□ PART 1: STAND UP

Text: John 5:1–9 + Matthew 14:28–30

The man at the pool of Bethesda had been sat there for 38 years of his life. Thirty-eight. Can you imagine that? Just waiting. Hoping. Surviving. And here's the kicker—he had become defined by his condition. That was his identity: the paralyzed man. Not his name. Not his story. Just the label stuck to his pain. And yet—he didn't lose hope. Day after day, when the waters were stirred, he still saw himself trying to get in. That's faith. That's resilience. That's a man who re-

fused to let the label be the ending. And then one day—grace located him. Jesus walks up and sees him. And I love this part: Jesus doesn't ignore him. Doesn't step around him. Jesus sees him. And not just the outer shell, but the pain, the longing, the decades of disappointment. And Jesus doesn't ask him to try harder or pray better. He simply says, "Get up." That's the invitation to you today. Get up. Not in your own strength, but in His. Because faith isn't about pushing harder, it's about trusting deeper. And hear this: the mat he sat on? That old, worn-out mat? Let's make that personal. For us, that mat might be guilt, or fear, or doubt, or shame. Things that pin us down. And today, God is saying—take it up and walk. Let that mat become your testimony, not your identity. Now... let's not forget Peter. He too was called out to step where he had no business stepping—on water. And the moment he had his eyes locked on Jesus; he did the impossible. He walked. But as soon as he looked at the wind, the waves, the fear began to sink. That's the lesson right there: What you fix your eyes on will determine whether you rise or fall. So, I'm saying to you—fix your eyes on the One who walks on storms. And don't stay down anymore.

☐ PART 2: STAND OUT

Text: Life of John the Baptist

Let's talk about John. John the Baptist didn't just stand up—he stood out. And I mean... way out. This guy lived in the wilderness. Wore camel hair. Ate locusts.

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If he showed up at your dinner party, someone would call the council. But he didn't care about being accepted, he cared about being obedient. People thought he was mad. Crazy, even. But that didn't stop him from doing what the Father told him to do. He didn't let the opinions of others shape his purpose. He knew who he was, and who sent him. That's boldness.

Here's what gets me—John baptized tax collectors. Do you know how hated they were? People saw them as traitors. Sellouts. But John didn't care about that either. He opened his heart to anyone who believed. Because standing out isn't about building walls—it's about being a light to people lost in darkness. And that's where you and I come in. You see, when you become a believer, you're handed a cross. And that cross can't be dragged in secret. It's visible. It has weight. It sets you apart. The moment we step out of these four walls, we represent something bigger than us. We become beacons—of hope, of truth, of the Kingdom. So don't be afraid to stand out. You weren't called to blend in. Ask God for courage—and walk boldly.

□ PART 3: PROCLAIM

Text: Acts 16:25–26 + Book of Job

Now this right here—it's the part that hits deep. Because I've got to be honest with you. There are days where I find it really hard to proclaim anything about God. Days where life just keeps swinging, and nothing makes sense, and any

praise that dares to come out of my mouth gets shut down by the chaos around me. But then I look at Paul and Silas—bruised, bleeding, shackled in a dark cell. They had every reason to complain. Every reason to give up. But what did they do? At midnight, when it was darkest, they praised. And not quietly either. They proclaimed God's glory in chains. And that kind of worship? It didn't just lift them—it broke the chains off everyone around them. Sometimes it's praise in the pain that unlocks breakthrough. And look-Job? Lost everything. His wealth. His children. His health. And yet, with nothing left... he still praised. Not because it was easy. Not because he understood. But because he knew who his Redeemer was. So, I'm encouraging you: proclaim God's goodness-even through tears. Even when it makes no sense. Even when it feels like you've got nothing left in the tank. Because that kind of proclamation? It doesn't just change circumstances—it changes you.

☐ ALTAR MOMENT / RESPONSE

So... what's your move? Do you need to stand up—for the first time in a long time? Do you need to stop hiding and stand out for real? Or maybe... maybe you've been silent for too long, and it's time to lift your voice and proclaim His name again. Wherever you are, whoever you are—God is calling you now. So don't sit this one out. This is your moment. Step in.
