



SATCOL'S KEY SUPPORTING ROLE IN JOHN LEWIS' CIRCULAR KNITWEAR COLLECTION

John Lewis recently launched an innovative unisex knitwear collection made in the UK, from 100% reclaimed and repurposed wool - using a blend of pre- and post-consumer fibres, and Salvation Army Trading

Company Ltd (SATCoL) has played a key supporting role as John Lewis' Fashion Cycle partner. The new knitwear collection is partly powered by customer donations to John Lewis' Fashion Cycle scheme, which is collected by SATCoL and sorted using its FibersortTM technology to separate garments made from wool fibres. This collection showcases a circular journey from unwearable wool to new knitwear.



THE Social Work of The Army is going steadily forward, and is proving itself of increasing value.

The war has swallowed up thousands of the men The Army has helped or was helping when it broke out. But it has also thrown new and important demands upon us. Take one example: men who were considered too old for really hard work have come forth—some from their own miserable dens, and others more miserable still from the Workhouses—taken up work several days a week, and are freely using the Homes and Shelters.

Some of the Institutions are helping to care for the khakimen who come and go, while in others employment under kindly conditions has been found for some of the wives and widows of the soldiers. In addition to this, the Men's Departments are carrying on a very useful effort for Munition Workers.

On the Women's side every Department is working at full stretch—the Industrial Homes, the Slum Centres, the Children's Institutions, the Women's Shelters, and other agencies are more than fully occupied. Moreover, not only is that work increasing in dimensions, but it is growing better and better in its results, and never was it more worthy of support and sympathy than now.

The conditions which have arisen owing to the war have again emphasized the wonderful unity of the various activities of The Army. It is a literal truth that no section of our operations can afford to say to any other section, "I have no need of thee."
