Poor as I am?


If I were a Shepherd I would bring a lamb; If I were a Wise Man I would do my part, Yet what I can I give Him, Give my heart.

A Year of Growth and Grace

As we approach the end of the year, I wanted to share an update on some of the changes that have taken place — and those still unfolding — within our community work.

Brunch Club

Lunch Club has transitioned smoothly into Brunch Club. Alongside this, we've supported four young adults to develop their employability skills through volunteering with us. This brings a fresh focus to our weekday programme and is enriching the lives of young people in our community by helping them grow in confidence and capability.

Citizens Advice

We now welcome Woking Citizens Advice Bureau every Friday from 10am to 12pm. This operates on a drop in basis, and I'd encourage anyone from our Corps to make use of this excellent resource. We're delighted to host such an established and valuable service.

Social Prescribing

Social Prescribing join us every other Tuesday from 12:30 to 2:30pm. This service connects people to community

activities and support that address the wider factors influencing health and wellbeing. Following a successful trial, the scheme has been extended to the end of this year — with plans to continue into 2026.

Core Recovery Bible Study

Our Core Recovery Bible Study begins on **Thursday 23rd Octo-ber**, meeting every other week from 7pm to 8:30pm. This follows the exploratory work we've done throughout the year — including the open meetings and the meeting led by Jon and Justin on Core Recovery back on Sunday 29th June.

Advent Bible Study & New Youth Support Group

Our Advent Bible Study starts on Wednesday 12th November, running weekly from 12:15 to 1:15pm. It's wonderful to reintroduce a weekday Bible Study to the programme here at the Corps.

Also launching on **12th November**, we have a new support group for school-aged children from 5pm to 7pm. This is led by Ashley, a member of our Sythwood community who connected with our Corps through SALT walks. Moved by

meeting a young person struggling with poor mental health, Ashley has been inspired to create a safe space for young people to share, encourage, and support one another.

Christmas & Beyond

The moment we stepped into the hall we noticed the chairs had been rearranged in a semi-circle, and knew the youth had taken over!

Ian and Alison together with Naomi and the young people led our worship, Alison explained that all the songs had been chosen by the youth.

Our 'call to worship' was Romans 5:1-2 'Therefore, since we have been made right in God's sight by faith, we have peace with God because of what Jesus Christ our Lord has done for us. Because of our faith, Christ has bought us into this place of highest privilege where we now stand, and we confidently and joyfully look forward to sharing God's glory'.

Ian said we are here to worship God so we sang together 'What a faithful God have I, what a faithful God'.

This was followed with a meaningful time of prayer led by Alison with prayers by young people and others followed by The Lord's Prayer. Naomi introduced the young children by explaining the two camps they had attended during the summer, and the impact on their young lives.

Isaac then shared some of his reflections on his week at **Encounter**, and Lilia and Samie talked about their time at **MAM**.

Agatha and her family shared their concern for the loss of a family member in Zimbabwe. We sang 'Big Family of God' Sue then offered prayer as the children left for Kid's Church.

We were again blessed by Penny's playing during the time of the offering. She had chosen the lovely tune from 'Out of Africa'. Ian then spoke of the deep faith and trust of people coming out of Africa with a big move to the UK.

Margaret Cook spoke of her thoughts as a Mum with sons on the trip to Zambia, also taking the opportunity to thank everyone for the help and encouragement she had in raising Matt and Sam and nurturing the boys spiritually, while Caroline Christie also expressed thanks for Woking SA community for their influence on Jemma and Rachel.

A slide show of the experiences of the trip to Zambia followed showing the local people's warm welcome to our group with a welcome dance, followed by pictures of the various activities including a visit Page 6 Tidings

to the Chikankata Mission, the radio station built by Alison's father, a visit to one of the chief's homes, Victoria Falls. Photos of Hayley and Matt doing a bungee jump and if that wasn't enough excitement, the whole group white water rafting!

Ian then showed photos of our group sharing with a family in their grief and pain, listening and being there for them.

Some of the group then shared Bible verses that had meant something to them, **Matt. 28:20** - Vicky

John 14:26 - Sam, **The Holy Spirit counsels us person to person** - Rachel.

Matt gave his own personal testimony of his special encounter with God and his assurance of always being with him.

Ian gave his thoughts on each of the scriptures which had been read. Make disciples by going where people are and listening to them. Be encouraged, Matt 22:14 'Many are called, but few are chosen'.

Our closing song 'Spirit of faith come down' was followed by a united Benediction Rom. 15:13

Based on Matthew 9:38 we have been urged to pray daily at 9.38am or 9.38pm or both, for volunteers, for leaders to sustain our ministry. The new training session of cadets (student officers) The Proclaimers of Transformation, has started at the WBC (William Booth College) but we need more candidates, more officers.

'Only by grace can we enter' helped us to focus on the fact that none of us, whoever we are, is good enough - but through his grace.....!! Throughout the morning, the subject of prayer was centre stage. We were reminded of the song 'Somebody prayed for me' and John spoke of those who had prayed for him and had led him to faith. There were snippets in our worship of where John had visited other countries and worshipped with fellow Christians which made us aware of how other Christians suffer for their faith. We need to hear more of John's travels!

Naomi presented gifts to Morelake, Dara, Morewa and Prince Isaac as this was their last Sunday with us, before their move to Canada with their parents, Wunmi and John during the following week. He is naturally quiet, but we had a nice conversation, and he shared that he was a solicitor in Nigeria, and that he had always listened to BBC World Service radio.

After this I had a chance to visit them at home. Up until that time, little Prince Isaac had not appeared to notice attempts to greet him. But the very next Sunday he said, 'I know you. You've been to our house'. This was a word of advice from a small child that really stuck with us in the children and youth team, as we continue to build relationship with other new families, and make sure to visit at home.

John is a thoughtful believer, and a clear influence on his children. Wunmi is a woman of prayer and encouragement, who also encourages her daughters to be capable and helpPage 16 Tidings

ful. Their daughters have names that reflect blessings of God: Morolake (known as Rolake) means the treasure of God; Mojola (known as Dara) is God's favour; Morewa means the beauty of God.

The three sisters really stuck together at first, but we have come to know them each little by little. They joined a few songster rehearsals, and each had favourite songs, once Jo managed to get a word out of them! Morewa had a placement at the hall for her school work experience as well, and if you look at the fridge you will see her handwriting there on a little magnet. The youth will certainly miss their humorous participation.

Prince Isaac has loved attending church and has been an enthusiastic participant in all the activities. We will miss them all.

When Wunmi and John broke the news of their pending move, the first question was, "where are you going?" Canada is a big country, so when they mentioned Edmonton in the province of Alberta, Louise immediately reacted, "oh! I have a cousin there!" Almost too good to be true, because they wanted to keep a connection with The Salvation Army and Sandie is their bridge. We have felt sad, but let's give thanks for the time we have had together, and continue to pray for the family as they settle in. Only by grace!!!!

My story in words - by John Hogarth



After sharing a little of my story a few Sundays ago, I've been asked if I would put it in words on paper. If I were to write it all down, it would fill 'Tidings' and may shock some of your readers! But I am happy to share some more of my story.

Before reading any further I would encourage you to read 'Only by Grace can we enter' number 471 in the Salvation Army songbook and to read 1 Peter 2:9-10.

As previously shared, prior to coming to faith on the 8th of November 1987 my life was a bit chaotic: leaving school before my time, and doing things my way, often on the wrong side of the law, and forever looking over my shoulder to keep safe from police and others who I may have crossed. My father asked me to leave

home when I was 18 because of my lifestyle of drink and crime. this resulted in not seeing my parents for nearly three years. Things came to a head when a person who I associated with tried to throw me out of a fifthfloor window, fighting back I was able to walk away.

I walked around Newcastle for hours wondering what to do, things were getting scary. I'd been arrested a few times and now my life had become threatened by an associate of mine.

I bit the bullet and rang my parents explaining everything and asked them if it was possible that I could return home, to try to get my life sorted out. They were hesitant because of the trouble and hurt I had caused. They eventually agreed, with some boundaries in place.

Things were on the up, settled back at home, finding a job. But the sinful nature was still working hard to drag me back to my old lifestyle, even former associates finding out where I lived and coming to the door. Things had to change! So, I decided to move away. In September 1979 I moved to Shepperton to begin all over again.

Working as a care assistant and moving up the ladder to assistant manager, and then relief manager, working across various care homes in Walton on Thames. Chertsey etc I was becoming quite successful. Eventually being able to buy a property in Sunbury on Thames in 1984. Brilliant I thought: Money in my pocket, nice car and property. I said to myself that I had come a long way in a short space of time. And then it all went wrong, and I lost everything. Who was I kidding? This uneducated Geordie could do no good.

It was back to the Northeast: Sleeping on my brother's sofa, technically homeless, and unemployed. One thing I can be thankful for is family, little did I know that family was going to get huge.

A couple of months after being back I got a small, smelly, grotty and damp flat and then the first of an amazing God event happened (Not that I knew that at the time). I got a knock at the door, and an old school friend was standing there, "How did you know I was here" I asked. He smiled and said, "we have our ways" and invited me for tea.

My journey towards salvation was about to begin.

After renewing our friendship, Pete and his wife Annette invited me to church, "No way" I said, "It's not for me". They didn't push, but gently every now and then an invite came, eventually I said "OK" and I went along,

After a couple of weeks, a lady by

the name of Margaret led the meeting, I can't remember a word that she said! But, back in my grotty flat I sat on my bed and spoke out loud "If you're real God, prove yourself to me" I didn't know how to pray, I just asked. A miracle happened, I felt so loved and warmed, like being wrapped in a cosy duvet and I had the best sleep from memory that I ever had. That was the night of the 8th of November 1987.

The next morning, I found a telephone and phoned my friends to share my news, and they said, "Before you say anything, we know", Apparently, they went back to Margaret's house and prayed, and someone said, "That's it" and they all went home. Well! That just blew my mind. My new life with Christ was about to begin.

The uneducated Geordie wanted to know so much about this person Jesus: who would die for his sin, I wanted to know what he said, what he did, where he went, who his followers were.

I was blessed to have a number of people who would nurture me, all special brothers and sisters. My family was growing.

One brother, Mike who worked with 'Open Doors' invited me to Romania, this was just three years after becoming accepted by God. We worked in children's orphanag-

es, he encouraged me to preach at church, and at his circus tent. It was a blessed time and when I have more time I'll share more of my time in Romania.

I was then hungry to know more about Christianity; I applied to go to Bible college to study theology. Don Hinchcliffe the principle interviewed me and one question he asked was "What makes you believe that you'll be able to study here? You have no GSCE's, no O levels, or even A level!". My reply I believe was God inspired "With God's help I will " I started college within five years into my new life, it was difficult. But, with Christ by my side I did it! finishing College in 1994

I continued my work in Romania also working with 'The Pocket Testament League' set up by the Cadbury family. Their daughter Helen was upset to see that her school friends didn't have a Bible, so the Cadbury chocolate dynasty began printing the gospels which Helen took to school. They are still doing the same today with Gary Woodall in the hot seat.

Life was exciting and then God took me in a direction that I didn't want to go. My life was in the mission field in Romania, but God's plan was different to mine! God took me to Tiverton Devon - never heard of the place before!

I was a new pastor of a growing church, my life was so far away from my previous life, and it was good. Then praise God, he gave me a wonderful wife. In seven years, God took an uneducated Geordie on a journey of unexplainable blessings, and the glories are all His.

It's only by grace.

It's an old song born out of one man's sorrow and distress. A song well known to an older generation but Google it to get the complete song if you're younger and unfamiliar with it.

Joseph Scriven was born in Ireland in 1819. He was educated and received a degree from Trinity College in Dublin and became a teacher. With plans to settle down and soon to marry, life was good for Joseph. Unfortunately, the day before his wedding, his future wife drowned.

The grief was more than he could bear, so Joseph moved to Canada to start again. There, he met and fell in love again, with Eliza Rice, and planned to be married, again. It is unthinkable that you could lose so much in one young lifetime but weeks before they were to be wed, Eliza became sick and died from her illness. Joseph was only 25.

From this heartache, and through faith in his God, a mission was born. Joseph took a vow of poverty and began to help the poor and the handicapped in any way he could. For ten years he made himself available to come alongside those that were in need and he found comfort and purpose in serving.

Then, unbelievably, heartache would strike again! His mother, still in Ireland and Scriven in Canada, became very ill and he did not have the funds to help her or to go and be with her. He penned the words to this poem **for her** and it has since comforted, encouraged and uplifted generations!
