Prayer matters...it really does!

Seek the Lord's grace and love:

- for the world, its peoples and leaders in these days...that wisdom and the common good may prevail, and especially in areas of conflict and discord. May the Church bring the light and hope!

Recently Donna preached about the disciple Thomas who doubted that Jesus had been raised from the tomb until he could see him for himself. '*Seeing is believing*', are the familiar words which Donna led us to, and specifically could be applied to Thomas and his situation. However, Donna made us aware that these words are only part of a wider sentence attributed to Thomas Fuller, a 17th century clergyman and historian, who actually said, "*seeing is believing but feeling is the truth*".

For Thomas, Jesus' disciple, this was certainly true - he wanted to see Jesus as well as touch his hands and side to confirm the amazing news which the women had shared that Jesus had risen from the dead! Hallelujah!

Perhaps we find ourselves in similar circumstances to Thomas too - slower to believe in something or someone until we can see or experience for ourselves?

As Christian followers this could cause us a dilemma when we are encouraging others to come into a living relationship with Jesus. How can this be achieved if we can't physically produce Jesus for others to see or experience for themselves? Are our efforts in ministry and outreach in vain? Far from it is my response!

Through how we live our lives, the words we choose to speak and the actions which we undertake on behalf of Jesus, we have the great privilege of allowing others to see and experience Jesus living through us.

In days such as these where many are feeling anxiety and hopelessness, there is even more reason for us to show Jesus to our families, friends and the wider community through our living, our ministry and our outreach.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul writes, "*I ask God to make you intelligent and discerning in knowing him personally, your eyes focussed and clear, so that you can see exactly what he is calling you to do*" (The Message).

Looking at these words in Bible Study recently, we concluded that when we are living that intimate, daily relationship with God, through Jesus, being empowered by the Holy Spirit, then this daily walk will have to have an impact on others...seeing can definitely lead others to believing, and may it be our continued prayer that others experiencing our way of life because of Jesus, may come to know the truth of following him as Lord and Saviour for themselves. This is the heart of the calling which we can live out for Jesus in these current times.
